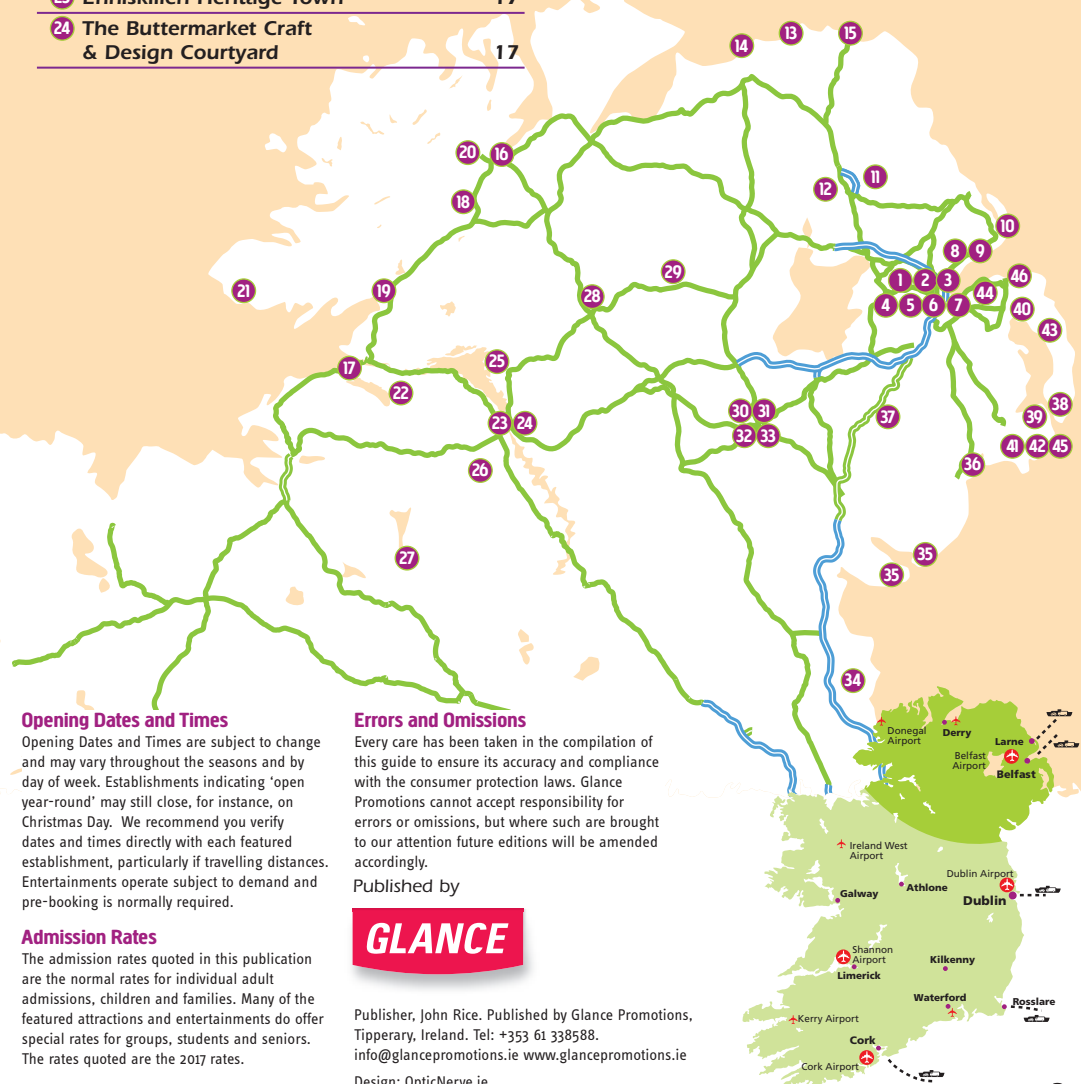

HMS Caroline is a five star-rated visitor attraction based in Belfast's Titanic Quarter. Step on-board and be blown away by a dynamic film showing the drama and devastation a battle can bring. Explore the impressively recreated cabins that have been restored as if the crew left the ship yesterday, listen in on the

everyday sounds in the Officers' cabins and enjoy interactive exhibits throughout the ship.

Experience the charm of the historic spaces that have been recreated to look as they did in 1916, the year HMS Caroline took part in one of the largest naval battles in history, the Battle of Jutland, of which she is the sole survivor.

Belfast City

Located in the heart of Belfast City

This iconic Portland stone and copper-domed building completed in 1906, was built as a symbol of Belfast's new city status. The interior has a number of notable features including The Porte-Cochère and Grand Entrance, The Grand Staircase, The Reception Room and The Great Hall.

In the grounds of City Hall visit the Titanic Memorial Gardens which host the Titanic Monument. The Memorial Garden was officially opened in 2012, the 100th anniversary of the Titanic sinking. The garden's memorial plinth supports 15 bronze plaques which list, in alphabetical order, the names of 1,512 people who perished on RMS Titanic.

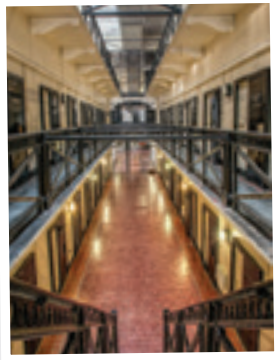

Crumlin Road Gaol

Belfast City

Explore over 150 years of history



Crumlin Road Gaol first opened its gates to prisoners in 1846 and was a fully operational prison, only closing its doors in 1996. During that time the Gaol housed murderers, suffragettes, loyalist and republican prisoners. It has

witnessed births, deaths and marriages, as well as executions, escapes, hunger-strikes and riots.

On your 75 minute guided tour you will be taken through the years and experience what life was like for those imprisoned in "The Crum". Step into the Circle and see each of the 4 wings radiate out. Explore C-Wing and see what prison conditions were like throughout the Gaol's history, you will also make the journey through the Tunnel that connects the Gaol and the Courthouse. Visit the Condemned Man's Cell and Execution Chamber, and finally, visit the Grave Site where many of the executed men still remain to this very day.

Built between 1890 and 1896 this is one of the best markets in the UK and Ireland. It has been selected for numerous local and national titles and awards for its fresh, local produce and great atmosphere. It holds a weekly market on Friday, Saturday & Sunday. It also hosts a range of events throughout the year.

Variety Market on Friday offers over 240 stalls selling a variety of products including: fruit, vegetables, antiques, books, clothes and fish.

City Food and Craft Market on Saturday offers a huge range of local, continental

The Ulster American and Ulster Scots connection



A traditional thatched cottage built in the 1750s by the Donaldson family and lived in by them until 1979. It has been restored to its original state including an open fireplace with a daub and wattle canopy and hanging crane. The interior includes a dresser, sponge wear crockery and iron pots and griddles. The centre has an

impressive exhibition on the life and career of Andrew Jackson (1767-1845) 7th President of the United States of America whose parents emigrated from here in 1765.

The US Rangers Centre is located on-site, a museum

dedicated to the men of the first battalions of the elite American Army Unit the "US Rangers" that was first 'activated' in Carrickfergus in 1942. The display includes documents, uniforms and photographs and other material detailing this famous combat unit.

A Dramatic Coastal Walk



Explore The Gobbins, a spectacular location where you can truly escape everyday life and experience nature at its most elemental. Your adventure is a 2.5 hour fully guided walking tour and will take you along a narrow path hugging the dramatic cliff face; across spectacular bridges amid the crashing waves of the North Channel; traversing

hidden Tunnels under the Irish Sea; up and down rugged staircases carved into the cliff face and into caves that were once home to smugglers and privateers.

The Gobbins Path is an arduous trek that is often narrow and uneven, accessed by a very steep pathway. Due to the nature of the rugged coastal location suitable outdoor clothing and walking boots or shoes are essential. To enjoy The Gobbins a good level of fitness is needed.

Flame Gasworks is Ireland's sole surviving gasworks and the largest in Western Europe. It opened in 1855 and supplied Carrickfergus with coal gas until 1967. It closed in 1987 but was restored by Carrickfergus Gasworks Preservation Society as a visitor attraction in 2002. View the 36 retorts, ascend the gasholder, and browse the collection of appliances. A fascinating visit - guaranteed!

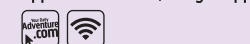

Gracehill Village

Gracehill Village, Co. Antrim

Northern Ireland's first Conservation Area

In 1765 Gracehill was founded by the Moravians, it is a village in County Antrim, Northern Ireland. It is Northern Ireland's First Conservation area.

Today the village is very reminiscent of what it was like in the 18th century with the layout of buildings and the unique Georgian style of architecture remaining the same.

In the centre of the village the Moravian Church can be found, facing the square and flanked by the Manse and the Warden's House. The burial ground, also known as "Gods Acre" can be reached from the

Brothers and Sisters Walks, on either side of the Church. These burial grounds are still in use today.

In 1975 Gracehill was designated a Conservation Area, it has also won many awards including the Europa Nostra Award.

Slieve League Cliffs, situated on the south west coast of Donegal, are one of the highest and finest sea cliffs in Europe.

At 601 metres (1,972 ft) views from here include Donegal Bay and surrounding counties Letrim, Sligo and Mayo.

To the west is the Atlantic Ocean, and North west is Rathlin O'Byrne Island and Glencolmcille. Nearby is Benbulbin with its megalithic tombs and mythical links to Finn McCool and the Fiona of old, and Knoch na Rí at Carrowmore where one of the largest and oldest known Neolithic cemeteries in Europe lies.

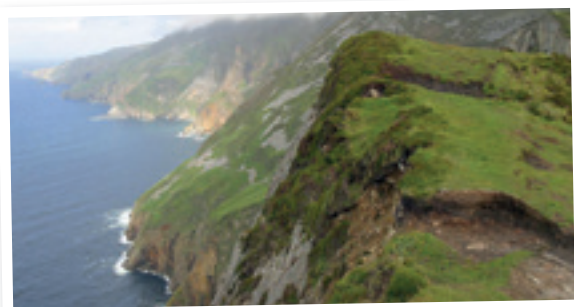
The area is full of history, Inishmurry - home to early Celtic Christian monks, and the port of Killala in Mayo - scene of the French landings in 1798, the remains of Ade McBric's chapel - an early Christian

monastic site, and ruins of the monks stone dwellings.

This is a sacred mountain, for over a thousand years there was a Christian pilgrimage, no doubt Slieve League was a sacred mountain before the Christians arrived here.

Please remember when visiting, not to disturb the monuments of Irish cultural heritage. There are no fences, so please respect the area.

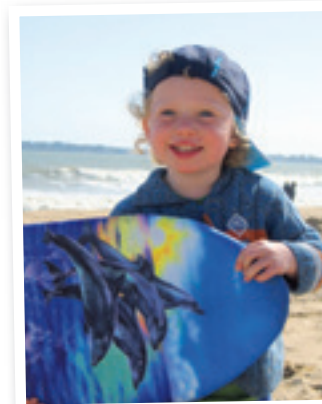

Enniskillen is the county town of Fermanagh, Ireland's only island town. Enniskillen is uniquely situated in the centre of the county between Upper and Lower Lough Erne.

In its most romantic interpretation Enniskillen derives its name from a translation of the Irish 'Inis Ceithlean' meaning 'Island of Kathleen'. Enniskillen Castle was built 600 years ago by the Gaelic Maguires and it was strategically important throughout its history.

The historic site now houses Fermanagh Visitor Information Centre, Fermanagh County Museum and The Inniskillings Museum (promoted jointly as Enniskillen Castle). The town



was subsequently established beside the castle. During the town's early expansion, bridges were constructed across the east and west fords onto the island. The church was set on the highest point.

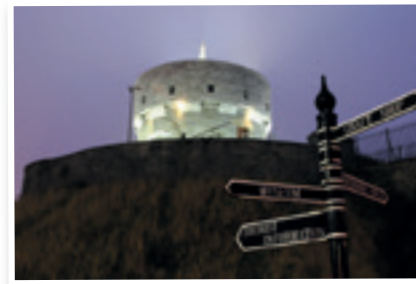

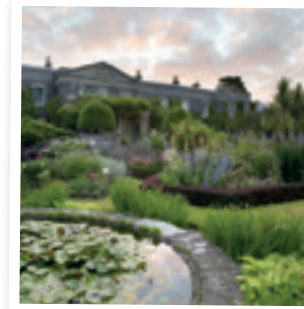

the remains of St. Patrick are reputedly buried on Cathedral Hill beside the Cathedral. The grave is still a place of pilgrimage each St. Patrick's Day. Downpatrick & County Down Railway is Ireland's only full sized heritage railway built on the town's former rail link to Belfast and links the town with Inch Abbey, a large ruined Cistercian monastic site on the outskirts of the town.
